When interviewed, Goulet said, "I have no specific health problems. I just believe in chiropractic." He continued, "I started taking chiropractic adjustments for built-up tensions caused by my very strenuous schedule. Now, whenever I feel tense or start to catch a cold I go to a chiropractor and get an adjustment. I feel better right away!"

Robert Goulet must stay in good health because of his extremely busy schedule. And busy he has been, since first he skyrocketed into the public limelight in 1960 with his now-historic role of Sir Lancelot in the Broadway musical, "Camelot."

A few years later, another Broadway show, "The Happy Time", earned Goulet the coveted "Tony" award as "Best Actor" and the praise of the New York Times as "surely one of the finest voices on the musical comedy state".

Television appearances - too numerous to mention - range from "The Ed Sullivan Show" (as early as 1962) to the Bob Goulet Specials. In 1966 he had his own series, "Blue Light". He has starred in several musical classics including "Kiss Me Kate" and "Brigadoon", which received five Emmys.

Motion picture credits include "Gay-Purr-ee", "Honeymoon Hotel", "I'd Rather Be Rich" and "Underground", a W.W. II espionage thriller. While singing is strenuous in one way, a rough-and-tumble picture such as that requires the peak of physical fitness.

Since Goulet's supper club debut in 1962 he has been packing in the crowds. Frequently appearing in Las Vegas, Goulet said, "I always begin my shows in Las Vegas with an adjustment as it makes me feel loose and free. It releases the tension in my muscles, my blood flows freely and my nerves are healthier which automatically eradicates any cold symptoms."

"Make no mistake about it, Robert Goulet is a talent of the first magnitude....he is the nation's best male singer of poplar songs," wrote the critic of a leading newspaper, referring both to his guest appearances on television as well as his concert and nightclub appearances.

Born November 26 in Lawrence, Massachusetts, Goulet, his mother and sister moved to Edmonton, Alberta, Canada shortly after his father's death when Goulet was eleven. It was in Canada that he was first exposed to the theater.

He was a bashful youngster, shy about his own talents. However, his family was aware that he had a fine singing voice and encouraged him in every way to use his natural gifts.

As we go to press, Goulet is teaming with his wife, Carol Lawrence, in an engagement at the Frontier Hotel in Las

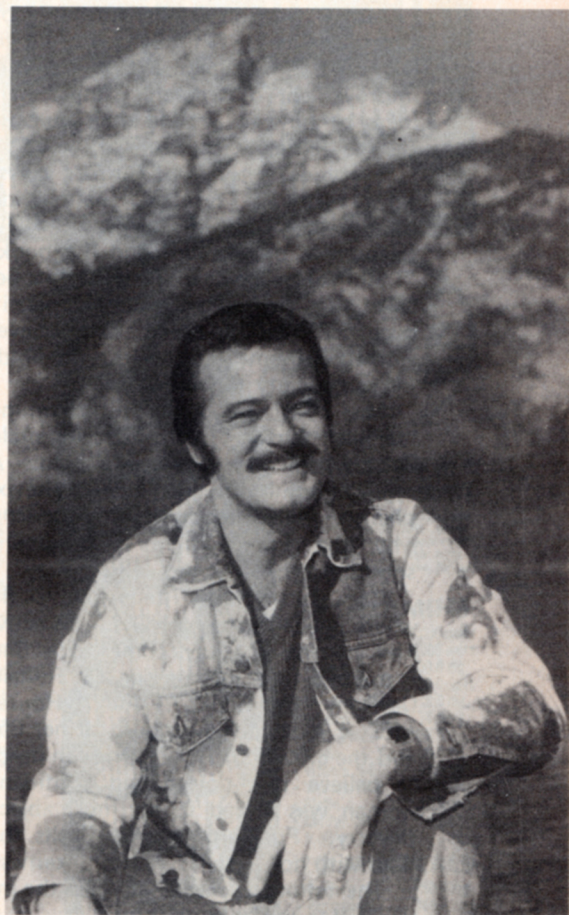
Vegas. It marked the second time the couple have appeared together in a Nevada resort. Judging by the public's overwhelming reaction to the Goulet's performances it won't be the last. "It's a blockbuster show," wrote John Scott of the Los Angeles Times after their first engagement.

The couple also star in "Monsanto Night Presents Robert Goulet and Carol Lawrence", a syndicated television special.

Goulet has also starred on almost every major variety television program including CBS-TV's "The Sonny and Cher Comedy Hour", NBC's TV "Follies", "The Flip Wilson Show" as well as such shows as Johnny Carson's and Merv Griffin's.

The Goulets have recently celebrated their tenth wedding anniversary. They have built a spacious home in Las Vegas. They also maintain a large estate in Beverly Hills, California and a summer home in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, the setting for the Monsanto Special. The couple have two sons, Christopher Joseph and Michael John.
